**Discussion Questions:**

1. What are nuclear weapons and when was the first one used?

2. There are many uses for nuclear technology - - what are the two main uses that are mentioned in the articles above?
3. Should any country be allowed to use nuclear technology for energy purposes? Why or why not? Who decides, and who should monitor this?
4. Does the United States need nuclear weapons? Why or why not?
5. If the United States needs nuclear weapons, do other countries need them? What are the deciding factors in which countries should be able to have nuclear weapons?
6. Research a bit about U.S. foreign policy - - which of these countries is the U.S. most worried and least worried about having nuclear weapons? Why? What is the U.S. approach to each of these countries, and do you agree with the U.S.'s stance?
